The standard dialect of American English**A**

In South Korea, the standard dialect is that spoken by the residents of Seoul. In Japan, it is the dialect spoken in Tokyo. In Taiwan, it is the speech of Taipei that is considered standard. It is not surprising, then, that many Asians assume that the standard dialect of American English is that spoken in New York (the economic capital of the States) or Washington DC (the political capital). This is not the case, however. As a matter of fact, native speakers of English in the United States often look down on the accent of native New Yorkers, considering it to be rough and uneducated.

So where does the standard dialect of American English come from? In some respects, the answer to this question is *nowhere*. The standard dialect of American English has evolved naturally through radio and TV broadcasts, and people who go into broadcasting often work hard to eliminate their regional accents.

As the Texas-native television journalist Linda Ellerbee once said, “In television you are not supposed to sound like you’re from anywhere.” Characters in movies and TV shows often speak this “regionless” dialect as well. For example, although the popular sitcom *Friends* was set in New York, none of the characters spoke with a typical New York accent.

However, the standard dialect is perhaps closer to the Midwest region dialect than any others. One reason might simply be that as the Midwest is in the middle of the country, it is strongly positioned geographically to be familiar to the people in surrounding regions. Another factor might be that John Kenyan, a graduate of Hiram University in Ohio, was the pronunciation editor of the highly influential second edition of *Webster’s New International Dictionary*, which played a major role in defining the standard pronunciation of American English.
